Tioga County Fair Code of Conduct Policy

Anyone attending Tioga County Fair “events” either as an exhibitor, advisor, volunteer, parent, family member, spectator, superintendent, judge, committee member, fair official, staff or board member must conduct themselves in a manner consistent with this Code of Conduct and according to the Rules and Regulations of the Tioga County Agricultural Association, Inc. d/b/a Tioga County Fair. This Code of Conduct and the Rules and Regulations promulgated by the Tioga County Fair are not limited to the show ring, but are applicable to any event held at the Tioga County Fairgrounds including, but not limited to meetings, workshops, clinics, contests, shows, and events at the county fair.

Exhibitors, Advisors, Volunteers, Parents, Family Members, Spectators, Superintendents, Judges, Committee Members, Fair Officials, Staff and Board Members MUST:

- Be responsible for your own behavior/conduct and uphold high standards for the group and accept consequences for inappropriate behavior
- Support and abide by the rules set forth by Fair Board, Superintendents, Committees, and Clubs
- Practice good citizenship, leadership, and self-governance
- Follow the direction of staff and other personnel with proper authority
- Demonstrate positive sportsmanship and attitudes at all times
- Be courteous and respectful to others
- Use appropriate language at all times
- Respect and adhere all rules and regulations that apply to participation/ competition

Exhibitors, Advisors, Volunteers, Parents, Family Members, Spectators, Superintendents, Judges, Committee Members, Fair Officials, Staff and Board Members MUST NOT:

- Demonstrate unsportsmanlike, unethical, or immoral conduct
- Use inappropriate language, (i.e., profanity or racially discriminatory language)
- Fail to adhere to all rules and regulations that apply to participation/ competition
- Possess or consume alcohol (Except at Fair Board approved events)
- Possess or consume illegal drugs, including the use of tobacco by a minor
- Possess or use weapons or fireworks (Except with prior approval from Fair Board)
- Possess or use objects with the intent to harm or intimidate others
- Destroy property of others, including the Tioga County Fair, in any manner, (i.e., graffiti)
- Violate an established curfew
- Disrespect bully, intimidate, or belittle adults, other participants, volunteers, staff, and or leaders of the event or others present on the fairgrounds
- Display postings, listings, pictures, and clothing that are deemed inappropriate on fairgrounds or on Social Media forums.
- Operate bikes, scooters, skateboards, ATVS or other vehicles on the Fairgrounds (Except as authorized by the Fair Board)
- Bring dogs (with the exception of service dogs) or other animals not entered in a Fair competition or event, onto the Fairgrounds (Except with prior approval from Fair Board).

The act of making an entry in the fair, participating, and/or attending events on the Tioga County Fairgrounds shall be considered your consent to abide by the Code of Conduct and shall further be considered your acknowledgement that you have read and understand the Code of Conduct and the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the Code of Conduct.

Violations of the Code of Conduct may result in disciplinary action, including but not limited to a verbal or written warning; suspension, reduction and/ or loss of premiums or prize monies; removal from the Fairgrounds; loss of future privileges to enter the Fairgrounds, permanent or temporary loss of the privilege to participate in Fair events; and/or suspension or removal from any position as Advisor, Volunteer, Superintendent, Judge, Committee Member, Fair Official, Staff or Board Member. Disciplinary action will be determined on a case-by-case basis depending upon the severity of the behavior and whether it is a repeated or an isolated instance.

Anyone wishing to report an alleged violation of the Code of Conduct shall do so, in writing, to the Tioga County Fair Grievance Committee (c/o Fair Secretary Jennie York – 242 Lake Road, Miller-ton, PA 16936). Properly reported allegations will be followed up on by the Grievance Committee as promptly as possible (generally at the next regularly scheduled Board Meeting), taking into consideration the severity of the alleged violation. Upon completion of any follow up, the Grievance Committee will advise the Tioga County Fair Board of Directors of the matter and its recommendation for resolution (generally at the next regularly scheduled Board Meeting). After presentation of the matter to the Tioga County Fair Board of Directors, the Grievance Committee will inform the person who made the report that the matter has been reviewed and, if a violation was founded, that the issue has been addressed in a manner determined appropriate by the Tioga County Fair Board of Directors. All decisions of the Tioga County Fair Board of Directors are FINAL. Individuals may be subject to disciplinary action for intentionally making false complaints or allegations to the Grievance Committee.

The Tioga County Fair Board of Directors reserves the right to remove any person, at their discretion, from the grounds who violates the Rules & Regulations and/or the Code of Conduct. The Tioga County Fair Board of Directors reserves the right to amend, change or add to these rules and regulations as they, in their judgment, may deem advisable.

GENERAL RULES PLEASE READ BEFORE MAKING ENTRIES	
1.	This is a County Exhibition. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules of the Tioga County Agricultural Association. Exhibitors must reside, go to school or belong to an agricultural organization within Tioga County. All entries must be grown, produced or made since the last fair.
2.	The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3.	Use of alcoholic beverages and/or drugs will not be permitted.
4.	Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
5.	All exhibits will be under the direction of the Tioga Co. Fair Board. In no case will the fair be responsible for any loss, injury, or damage done or occasioned by, or arising from any animal exhibited by the exhibitor. Upon this condition only are entries accepted.
6.	Entries will be made according to classification. All entrants must fill out an official entry blank. Entry blanks may be found elsewhere in this book and may be obtained from the fair secretary or the extension office. Exhibitors who wish may obtain entry tags prior to the fair by sending a request to Jennie York, 242 Lake Rd., Millerton, Pa. 16936. Please use adequate postage.
7.	Exhibits in Departments 18, 19, & 23 must be entered between 12 p.m. and 4 p.m. on Saturday, August 6, 2022. Judging for these Departments will be held on Sunday, August 7, 2022. Exhibits in Depts. 12, 13, 14, 15, 17 & 20 must be entered between 12 p.m. and 5 p.m., Sunday, August 7, 2022. Judging for these Departments will be held on Monday, August 8, 2022. This includes Grange and other Group Exhibits. NO EXHIBITS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER 5 P.M. SUNDAY, AUGUST 7, 2022.
8.	All exhibits listed in rule #7 will be released on Sunday, August 14, 2022 between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Premium checks will be issued at that time.
9.	ALL LIVESTOCK (including those listed for competition in the Jr. Dairy Show) must be on the grounds by 3:00 p.m. Monday, August 8, 2022. Open Dairy Show Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competition on the grounds by 4:00 p.m., Thursday, August 11, 2022, but may also come in Wednesday, August 10, 2022 between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. ALL ANIMALS listed for competition shall remain on the premises until 8:00 p.m., Saturday, August 13, 2022.
10.	NO PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE ISSUED UNTIL STALLS ARE CLEANED.
11.	Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in the class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves.

12.	Appropriate ribbons will be awarded winners in the various classes and cash prizes paid as stated in the Premium List.
13.	Stickers indicating placing will be placed on exhibitor's card.
14.	No exhibitor may enter more than ONE EXHIBIT in each division of the class, with the exception of livestock classes. No duplicate entries accepted for the sake of entering in more than one class.
15.	If the fair management believes any of the exhibits were shown in previous years, those entries may be refused.
16.	Possession of a ribbon is not sufficient evidence for cash awards; the record of the treasurer shall be final evidence.
17.	The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proved. In such case, the Superintendent, Manager, or Secretary of the fair or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.
18.	It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the PROPER NAME of the article or breed of livestock entered. ANY ITEM ENTERED IMPROPERLY WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. The judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner. NO ENTRIES MAY BE MADE IN CLASSES NOT LISTED IN THE BOOK.
19.	The Superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, and products of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
20.	The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit unfit for exhibition. NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE CLOSE OF THE FAIR EXCEPT BY CONSENT OF THE MANAGEMENT. Exhibitors shall forfeit premium money for early exit without a release from the Fair Management.
21.	Judging is viewed as an educational process and the public is encouraged to view the judging event. DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN THEIR OWN DEPARTMENTS, but neither they nor any other exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
22.	All livestock offered for premiums must be the property of the owners for thirty (30) days or longer.
23.	No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except judge, superintendents and necessary attendants.
24.	Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
25.	Overfitting of livestock will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
26.	When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and under control of owner or employee.
27.	Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AND
RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANIMALS FOR
EXHIBITION, INCLUDING COMMERCIAL EXHIBITION

This document provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's animal health requirements and recommendations for the Pennsylvania County and Community Fairs. All exhibitors are encouraged to check with the management of each fair in advance to ensure compliance with all fair requirements.

Fair management is requested to maintain records and asked to provide contact information of owners of all animals which are exhibited to PDA upon request.

It remains our goal to continue poultry exhibitions in 2021. We will continue to monitor reports of avian influenza cases that may occur in the United States that could put our poultry industry at risk.

The following Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinary Consultation Relationship statement for the animals and poultry being exhibited must be included with a signature line on the fair registration form: *"I attest and affirm that a "veterinary consultation relationship" – as that phrase is defined in the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law found at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2501 et seq. and any amendments thereto – exists with regard to any animals I will be exhibiting."* Animals entering with a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) are exempt from this statement requirement.

For specified events at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex, including the Pennsylvania Farm Show, the Pennsylvania All-American Dairy Show, the Pennsylvania State Junior Dairy Show, the Keystone International Livestock Exposition, the Pennsylvania Fall Holstein Show and the Pennsylvania State 4-H Horse Show, exhibitors will need to consult the 2020 show managements' requirements.

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture recommends that animals returning home from fairs and shows be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for a minimum of three weeks to help prevent the spread of disease, and recommends that exhibitors of all animals discuss the health of their animals, including vaccine recommendations, with a veterinarian on a regular basis.

PDA also encourages animal and poultry owners to register their premises so they can be contacted in a disease emergency situation. Call 717-836-3235 to register your premises.

Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, **do not use it!**

*****Important!*** If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics or any chemical from fitting products, is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.**

**IMPORTANT:ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE

**ANIMALS MAY ONLY UNLOAD & CHECK IN

All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this (preprinted on the CVI—requires veterinarian's signature) is required on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) when a CVI is required. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.

Before importing animals from a state or area which is quarantined to prevent the spread of disease, owners must contact the Department to obtain current regulations regarding imports from that state or area.


CAMELIDS

Section 1: Pennsylvania Camelids:

PDA has no requirements for Pennsylvania camelids at fairs.

Recommendations:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
3. Individual official identification (ID).

Official ID will have  a US shield and includes:

- ▶ A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag ; or
- ▶ A 15-digit Animal Identification Number eartag starting with "840"; or
- ▶ An electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader); or

- ▶ Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable) ; or
- ▶ For animals without any of the ID options listed in number 3 above on the CVI accredited veterinarians simply need to:
 - form obtained from the Department Agriculture)
 - accredited veterinarians simply need to:
 - ^ check other and mark “Camelid” in box number 5
 - ^ write the animals color in box number 14
 - ^ record date of birth (age) in box number 17
 - ^ record gender in box number 16 and
 - ^ record either Llama or Alpaca in box number 15

. *In addition, veterinarians are encouraged to write down any distinguishing markings that are present on the animal. or include a photo to accompany the CVI. Questions regarding proper identification for camelids on CVIs for Pennsylvania fairs can be directed to PDA at 717-783-6851.

Section 2: Out of State Camelids Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement and signed by the accredited veterinarian: (All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.”
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI .
4. Identification required: A person may not import camelids unless each animal is individually by a unique ear tag issued or approved by the State or country of origin, by a permanent tag or unique mark (tattoo) approved by the Department or by some other device or means of identification (microchip) approved by the Department. Questions regarding proper identification for camelids imported into Pennsylvania can be directed to the Department by calling 717-783-6851.
5. Tuberculosis Testing requirements:
No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.

▶ All animals originating from states or zones designated “Modified Accredited Advanced” must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

▶ All animals originating from states or zones designated “Modified Accredited” must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

Recommendations:

All out of state camelids must meet all criteria listed above as “requirements”. PDA has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state camelids.

DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

VACCINATION REQUIREMENT of Tioga Co. Fair

All cattle must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, signed by an accredited veterinarian, that includes a statement that the animal(s) identified have been immunized against IBR, PI3, and BVD.

Animals that have never been vaccinated against BVD, IBR, PI3 AND BRSV or have not been vaccinated against BVD during the previous 12 months, must receive one dose of modified live virus vaccine given at least 15 days, and not more than 180 days before the show, or two doses of killed vaccine, two to four weeks apart, with the last dose given at least 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show.

Animals that have been vaccinated against BVD, IBR, PI3 AND BRSV within the previous 12 months must receive at least a single injection of modified live virus or killed virus vaccine given not less than 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show.

Hyperimmune serum may not be used as a substitute for the above vaccination requirement.

Section 3: Pennsylvania Cattle:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022 is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the Statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
3. Cattle shall be identified by an official ear tag or other unique identification device approved by PDA. Official identification includes:
 - Official ID will have a **US shield** and includes:
 - A USDA-issued National Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number eartag starting with “840” (including RFID) or;
 - Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable.)
4. Rodeo: It is recommended that rodeo cattle of all ages be negative on an official tuberculin test within 60 days prior to the start of the fair unless they are members of and originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The cattle can be accompanied by the negative test report or recorded on the CVI by the veterinarian.

5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

(Rabies vaccination must be administered prior to July 25, 2022.) Tioga Co. Fair requirement.

Section 4: Out of State Cattle:

Requirements:

1. Federal regulations (USDA) require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cattle entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement and signed by the accredited veterinarian: (All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Federal regulations (USDA) requires individual official animal identification. Official ID will have a **US shield** and includes:

A USDA-issued National Eartagging System (NUES) tag: or
A 15-digit Animal Identification Number eartag starting with "840" (including RFID or:

Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable.)

5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is **required** for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

(Rabies vaccination must be administered prior to July 25, 2022)

6. Tuberculosis Testing Requirements:

No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA. All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be

included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals to be imported (all ages) are test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report. A copy of the original test report is acceptable.

Special Tuberculosis Test requirement for Rodeo Cattle

All rodeo cattle and bison from out of state must be negative on an official Tuberculosis test within the 60 days prior to entering Pennsylvania, unless they originate from and are members of an Accredited Tuberculosis-free Herd within an accredited Tuberculosis free state or zone. This requirement for rodeo cattle from out of state is in addition to all other requirements listed above for out of state cattle.

(Rabies vaccination must be administered prior to July 25, 2022.) Tioga Co. Fair requirement.

Section 5: Pennsylvania Cervids:

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) program participants: Contact the Department (717-772-2852 or 717-783-5309)+ for specific requirements for exhibition of CWD-susceptible cervids to remain compliance with CWD programs. Requirements:

1. Individual official animal identification is required.
Official ID includes:
 - ☐ A legible and unique tattoo approved by the PDA and USDA;
 - ☐ A USDA-issued ear tag, bearing a unique number provided by USDA that utilizes one of the following numbering systems:
 - ☐ The National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) or
 - ☐ The Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag bearing 15 digits starting with '840' or
 - ☐ The premises-based numbering system using a Premises Identification Number (PIN) in conjunction with a livestock production numbering system; or
 - ☐ An electronic implant device, such as a microchip that utilizes a nationally unique 15 digit animal identification number starting with '840' provided an appropriate reader is immediately available wherever the animal is located.
2. All cervids: Fair management is responsible for providing contact information of owners of all cervids which are exhibited to Mary Martin at the Department within 7 days of the last day of the exhibition (717-783-5309) or marymartin@pa.gov).
3. **Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) program status:**
Contact the Department (717-772-2852 or 717-783-5309 for specific requirements for exhibition of CWD-susceptible cervids to remain in compliance with CWD programs.

Requirements (Tioga Co. Fair) for Fair Animal Health Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued after May 1, 2022.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Section 6: Out of State Cervids:

Requirements:

1. *All CWD-susceptible cervid species*: A written import permit is required from the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture. Call Mary Martin at 717-783-5309 between 8 AM and 4 PM weekdays. Call for a permit at least 30 days in advance.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The CVI shall confirm that the cervid originates from a herd that has been classified as "Certified in a government-administered CWD herd certification program with components as determined by 9 CFR Part 55.24.
3. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cervids entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement and signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have neither exposed to VS nor located 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
4. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
5. Two forms of individual ID are required for CWD-susceptible species (including whitetail deer, elk, moose, mule deer, blacktail deer, sika deer, red deer, and hybrids. One form of identification listed below is required as 'official' animal identification. The second device may be either a second form of 'official' animal identification or a form of individual animal identification unique to that animal within the herd and linked to the CWD database. Non CWD-susceptible species require only the 'official' form of identification; a second form is not required. Consultation with PDA on currently acceptable forms of identification is strongly recommended when anticipating importation of cervids.
Official ID includes:
A legible and unique tattoo approved by the Department and USDA; or,
 - ☐ A USDA-issued ear tag, bearing a unique number provided by USDA that utilizes one of the following numbering systems:
 - ☐ The National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES);
 - ☐ The Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag bearing 15 digits starting with '840';
 - ☐ The premises-based numbering system using a Premises Identification Number (PIN) in conjunction with a livestock production numbering system; or
 - ☐ An electronic implant device, such as a microchip that utilizes a nationally unique 15 digit animal identification number starting with '840' provided an appropriate reader is immediately available wherever the animal is located.
6. Brucellosis Testing Requirements:
*All sexually intact cervids 12 months of age and older are test-eligible.
*If the animal is from a Brucellosis Certified-free Herd, no further testing is required. The date of the most recent herd test and test results must be included on the CVI.

*If the animal is from a Brucellosis Monitored Herd, it must be brucellosis test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and the test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the laboratory test report (a copy of the test report is acceptable).

* If the animal is from a herd with no brucellosis status, it must be brucellosis test negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and the test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the laboratory test report (a copy of the test report is acceptable).

7. Tuberculosis Testing Requirements:

Cervids of all ages are test-eligible.

If the animal is from a Tuberculosis Accredited Herd, no further testing is required. The date of the herd test and test results must be included on the CVI.

If the animal is from a Tuberculosis Monitored or Qualified Herd, it must be tuberculosis test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

If the animal is from a herd with no tuberculosis status, it must be test negative on two consecutive tuberculosis tests conducted at least 90 days apart, with the last test conducted within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the tests and test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the negative test reports (copies of the test reports are acceptable).

8. All cervids: Fair management is requested to provide contact information of owners of all cervids which are exhibited to Mary Martin at the Department within 7 days of the last day of the exhibition (717-783-5309) or marymartin@pa.gov)

Recommendations:

All out of state cervids must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". PDA has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of the state cervids.

Dog Health Requirements See Page 19

Section 8: Pennsylvania Equine Animals:

The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania equines at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
3. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable).

Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals three months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and Veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a Rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse - such as lip, tattoos, brands, or microchips.

(Rabies vaccination must be administered prior to July 25, 2022).

Section 9: Out of State Equine Animals:

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement and signed by the accredited veterinarian: "(All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.)"
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a dam with negative EIA official test results are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals three months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and Veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a Rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse - such as lip, tattoos, brands, or microchips.

(Rabies vaccination must be administered prior to July 25, 2022).

6. If an animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a total of 30 days or more within 6 months of entry into the commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for Babesia caballil and Theileria equi on a (c-ELISA) test, or a Department –approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of the test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.,

Section 10: Pennsylvania Goats:

Requirements:

1. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats.
Official ID includes:
A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear— state postal code and letters/numbers-- and individual animal ID in the left ear; or
A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022 is required.
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).

For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:

- a. Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information.
*Official identification (as described above)
*Sale date
*Sale location
*Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
*Hauler contact information
*Destination name and contact information
*Total number of animals in the shipment
*Type of goat (i.e. meat, dairy, specific breed)
*Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
Those slips must follow the goat to their final destination (including slaughter facilities)
- b. Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records slips and a copy of any ICVIs (in b. above) must be kept for 5 years.

Section 11. Out of State Goats

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days of importation,
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the last 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must free of evidence of infectious or contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:

Official ID includes:

- A. A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
- B. A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear— state postal code and letters/numbers-- and individual animal ID in the left ear; or
- C. A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.

All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

All animals originating from states or zones

designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have been tested negative within 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have been tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed.

The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied a negative] test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable.

6. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:

- a. Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information.
 - *Official identification (as described above)
 - *Sale date
 - *Sale location
 - *Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - *Hauler contact information
 - *Destination name and contact information
 - *Total number of animals in the shipment
 - *Type of goat (i.e. meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - *Signature of consignee, agent, or haulerThose slips must follow the goat to their final destination (including slaughter facilities)
- b. Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records slips and a copy of any ICVIs (in b. above) must be kept for 5 years.

Section 12: Pennsylvania Poultry, including Chickens, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds, Ratites, Pigeons/Doves and Hatching Egg Requirements:

1. All Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued butt end style leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons and doves must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official PDA leg band.
2. **An owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health certificate or CVI) must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, water fowl, upland game birds, ratites, pigeons/doves, and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:**
 - Name and location of exhibition; and
 - Name, address, and telephone number of the owner;
 - And a statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of contagious diseases, and
 - Owner signature and date of that signature.

3. **Avian Influenza Testing and Verification** (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian). All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds and ratites, (pigeons/doves and avian species other than poultry are excluded), and their hatching eggs for exhibition must originate from a flock in which a random representative

4. **Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification** (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian). Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, and ratites (waterfowl pigeons doves and avian species other than poultry are excluded) and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) ; or from a flock in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent NPIP -2 form or state equivalent form must accompany the birds or hatching eggs (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative.

3. **An owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health certificate) must accompany all poultry including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, ratites, and pigeons and doves, and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:**
Name and location of exhibition; and
Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
A statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and Owner signature and date of that signature.

4. Avian Influenza Testing and Verification: All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian). All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds and ratites, and their hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in

5. Pullorum-typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (Pigeons /Doves excluded) (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Veterinarian).

All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, waterfowl, and ratites (pigeons/doves excluded) and hatching eggs must come from NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean flocks in good standing with the program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) and the birds must be accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form;

or

All individual birds for exhibition, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, waterfowl, and ratites (pigeons/doves excluded) (maximum of 300) must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent NPIP 9-2 must accompany the birds (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative.

The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards.

*Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.

*Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.

*Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.

*Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.

*Waterfowl shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.

*All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling must come from a flock in which all of the eligible birds in the flock (up to 300) have been test negative within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition.

Section 14: Pennsylvania Rabbits:

Requirements:

The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania rabbits at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Recommendations:

1. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022.

Section 15: Out of State Rabbits:

Requirements:

No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other item, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) has been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is a reasonable suspicion it exists unless they meet the following requirements.

(a) All live rabbits must be accompanied by an ICVI and must be examined by an accredited veterinarian within the the seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date of shipment to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The ICVI must include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:

- (i) All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found to be free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases.
- (ii) All rabbits have originated from a single premises that has no signs of infectious, contagious or communicable disease in rabbits.
- (iii) There have been no movements of rabbits onto the premises of origin within the 90 days prior to the date of shipment; and
- (iiiv) The rabbits have had no contact with wild or captive rabbits other than their cohorts in the 90 days prior to the date of shipment.

(b) No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other item, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a premises exposed to RHD, or where there is a reasonable suspicion the disease exists or the rabbits have been exposed to or infected with RHD.

Fair management has the authority to impose additional requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

For Rabbits that originate from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHD has NOT been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is NO reasonable suspicion it exists:

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. A statement on the CVI attesting that all rabbits listed on the CVI are free of signs of infectious and contagious disease.

Section 16: Pennsylvania Sheep:

Requirements:

1. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official scrapie ID includes:

A USDA ear tag with a US Shield or

A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear-- state postal code and letters/ numbers- -and individual animal ID in the left ear ;

or

A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022 is required. (Tioga County Fair)

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). **(Rabies vaccination must be administered between July 26, 2019 and July 25, 2022.) (Rabies vaccine in sheep good for 3 years).**
4. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - a. Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information.
 - * Official identification (as described above)
 - * Sale date
 - * Sale location
 - * Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - * Hauler contact information
 - * Destination name and contact information
 - * Total number of animals in the shipment
 - * Type of sheep (i.e. meat, wool, specific breed)
 - * Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

1. Federal regulations (USDA) requires a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into PA .
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement and signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required.

Official scrapie ID includes:

- * A USDA ear tag with a US Shield or
 - * A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. a scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear-- state postal code and letters/ numbers- - and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - * A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.
5. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:

- a. Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information.
 - * Official identification (as described above)
 - * Sale date
 - * Sale location
 - * Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - * Hauler contact information
 - * Destination name and contact information
 - * Total number of animals in the shipment
 - * Type of sheep (i.e. meat, wool, specific breed)
 - * Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

Those slips must follow the sheep to their destination (including slaughter facilities)

- b. Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records and a copy of any ICVIs (in b. above) must be kept for 5 years.

A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). **(Rabies vaccination must be administered between to July 26, 2019 and July 25, 2022.) (Rabies vaccine in sheep good for 3 years.)**

Section 18: Pennsylvania Swine:

Requirements:

1. No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal:
 - * Is accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the fair;
 - * Is permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
 - * Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
2. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine.
 - a. Breeding swine must be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
 - b. Breeding swine animal exhibitions shall arrive , exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours.
 - c. Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays which are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition , as long as , reasonable precaution is made to ensure the bio-security of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.
3. All Market swine exhibited in Department sponsored market show shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which sales are designated slaughter only sales.

4. Non-PDA sponsored shows including jackpot shows and 4-H round-ups, not occurring during a PDA sponsored fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:
 - a. As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 14 days of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series radio frequency (RFID) identification ear tag.
 - b. Arrival, exhibition, and departure of the swine occur within a 72-hour window.
 - c. There is no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
 - d. An Accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor visually inspects the animals prior to unloading, and they are found to be free of signs of contagious disease.
 - e. An accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs.
 - f. A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an Accredited Veterinarian, and that Veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official

Section 19: Out of State Swine:

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 14 days prior to the date of the show is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months), in these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement and signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.).
4. Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
5. Individual animal ID — must permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
6. **Brucellosis Testing Requirements:**
No brucellosis test is required if the animal originates from a Validated Brucellosis-Free State or Brucellosis-Free Herd. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.

7. **Pseudorabies Testing Requirements:**
 - a. Sexually intact swine over 6 months of age shall originate from a qualified PRV negative herd or be test negative to an official pseudorabies test within 30 days prior to the date of importation.
 - b. No pseudorabies testing required for all other swine.
8. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine.
 - a. Breeding swine must be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
 - b. Breeding swine animal exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours.
 - c. Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays which are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as, reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.
9. All Market swine exhibited in Department sponsored market show shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which sales are designated slaughter only sales.
10. Non-PDA sponsored shows including jackpot shows and 4-H round-ups, not occurring during a PDA sponsored fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:
 - a. As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 14 days of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series radio frequency (RFID) identification ear tag.
 - b. Arrival, exhibition, and departure of the swine occur within a 72-hour window.
 - c. There is no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
 - d. An Accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor visually inspects the animals prior to unloading, and they are found to be free of signs of contagious disease.
 - e. An accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease and the accredited shall immediately report all suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.
 - f. A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an Accredited Veterinarian, and that Veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official

All swine on fairgrounds must go to slaughter, They may not return to farm of origin!
 Regulations of Pennsylvania Dept. of Agriculture

Section 20: Pennsylvania Dogs:

Requirements:

A current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 12 weeks of age or older.

Recommendations:

1. All rabies vaccinated dogs must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. The certificate must contain legible name, contact information and signature of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine. A copy of the rabies certificate is acceptable.
2. All animals are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

Section 21: Out of State Dogs:

Requirements:

1. Proof a current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 12 weeks of age and older.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) written within 30 days of importation. Exemption: a person may bring one or more dogs into Pennsylvania for show or other demonstration without a CVI for a period not to exceed 30 days provided that each dog is equipped with a collar bearing a name plate giving the name and address of the owner.

Recommendations:

1. All rabies vaccinated dogs must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. The certificate must contain legible name, contact information and signature of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine. A copy of the rabies certificate is acceptable.
2. All animals are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.

A. Restraining Animals

1. Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
2. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
3. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
4. **A. Animals** unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.

B. Handling - Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, than loud, rough handling.

C. Bedding - All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.

D. Feed & Water - Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.

E. Transportation - Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.

F. Blanket/Sweat Collars - Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.

G. Health - It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medicine is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

4. Out of state horses must have Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection satisfying requirements from state of origin.
5. Refer to Rules in the front of the book for further details. Stallions will not be permitted to show. (Page14, Sec.8)
6. Warm ups will be given before the show starts, after in-hand classes, and before trail classes. There will be a lunch break announced the day of the show. Gaits above a trot are not permitted outside of the show ring.
7. Riders may ride more than one horse - separate registration fee paid per horse.
8. The same horse may be ridden by different riders - separate registration fee paid per rider.
9. Show committee has the right to combine and remove classes as needed.
10. All exhibitors 18 years of age or younger are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear passing or surpassing current applicable ASTM (American Society for Testing Materials) / SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with harness secured while riding or driving anywhere on the event grounds. This applies to all exhibitors 18 years of age or younger, including all 4-H members regardless of age.
11. Proper show apparel is required. Chaps are not required for western classes.
12. Riders may be excused for excessive whipping or batting.
13. Riders showing poor sportsmanship may be dismissed by the horse show committee and fees forfeited.
14. Judges decision is final. Judge may not be approached by exhibitors. Complaints will be brought to announcer first.

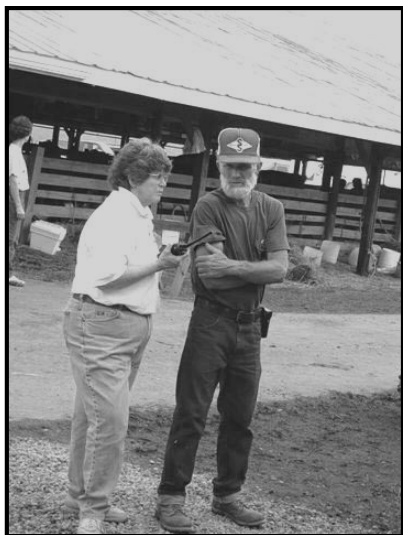

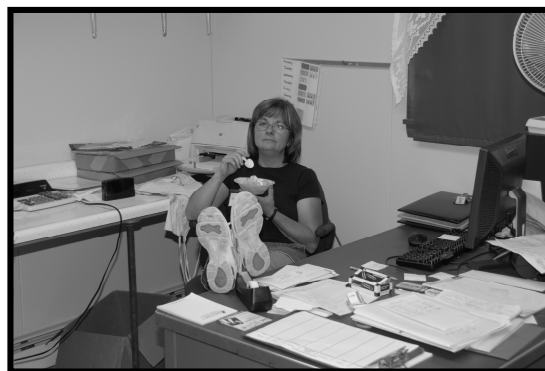

Pens must also be thoroughly cleaned and all organic material must be removed before used by an animal from a SFCP flock. When sheep and goats are being led around the show/sale ring this would be considered acceptable "limited contact".

2. Entries in this Section must be made by June 1, 2021.
3. Jr. exhibitors may show two pair of meat birds in the market poultry class.
4. The recommended age for meat birds 7-8 weeks for commercial breeds. Birds will be weighed and must be between 5 and 9 pounds. No exhibitor may enter more than two meat bird pairs. If exhibitors have questions about when to purchase their meat birds so that they do not grow too large by the time of the fair, contact the Extension Office.
5. (The words *meat birds* refers to a chicken, not a bird of any other species or type.)
6. **Meat Birds MUST be obtained from the source identified by the Tioga County Fair Poultry Department in 2021.**

RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Out of county exhibitors welcome to enter rabbits. Out of state rabbits require a veterinarian signed health certificate. (CVI) Refer health rules on page 22 of this book.
2. Each exhibitor must sign the "Veterinary-client-patient relationship statement" provided on the entry form. All rabbits will be health checked upon arrival. Any rabbits displaying clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease or appear ill must be removed from the fair grounds and your entry fee will be forfeited. Out of state rabbits require an Interstate Health Certificate (CVI).
3. All rabbits must be permanently and legibly tattooed in left ear prior to arriving at the fair grounds.
4. All rabbits will be judged according to the latest ARBA standard of perfection. Judge's decisions are final. This is not and ARBA sanctioned show. No legs will be issued..
5. Rabbits entered must be the bonified property of the exhibitor prior to show.
6. This is a one day carrying cage show. Carriers must have leak proof bottoms.
7. 4-H/FFA exhibitors are required to coop & display all entered rabbits, as cage space allows, for entire week of fair.
- 8.. All rabbits must be in the showroom by 8:30 AM, show starts promptly at 9:30 AM.
9. Day of show add-ons for pre-entered exhibitors accepted for a \$3.00 entry fee per rabbit, and **MUST** be entered NO later than 8:30 AM.
10. 4-H Cloverbuds are only permitted to enter in the Open Show Dept. 9 per 4-H policy. No pet class is offered in Dept. 9. Cloverbuds are welcome to coop their rabbits with their 4-H club for the week of the fair, if they would like to. Please simply write : **"COOPING REQUESTED"** on the top of their entry form and follow check in and cooping times listed in Dept. 10.
